





THE ART OF of DROP Painting

How many large, full-stage backdrops have you painted for Crazy for You?

A: We created four backdrops for the show: a desert landscape, the New York City skyline circa 1930, and two for the Gaiety Theatre in Deadrock, Nevada - an interior of the theatre and a backstage view.

How long did it take to create the backdrops?

A: Usually, it takes about a week to create a backdrop, depending on the complexity of the

design and the techniques we use to translate the information in full scale. More time is allotted for backdrops that need more detail. The New York City drop is the one I am most excited about. What makes it so interesting, other than being such a great visual, is the painting we had to do around translucent areas, which permits the back lighting to show through. We also sprayed, instead of brushed, additional details on the drop to create a softer, more natural look. For the Backstage Drop we also used a technique known as spattering, or shaking the brush in a controlled movement, to create an older, grimier look on the drop.

You also paint all the set pieces, any interesting things to look for?

A: When we start our design meetings, I have a conversation with each show's set designer to make sure we fulfill their vision for the production. He or she sends us drawings or renderings, which we then make tangible. Once our scene shop crew, Richard, Hal and Joe, have built the sets, they give them to me and my team, Sean Cox and Noelle Ruegg, and we paint the desired effects. One interesting detail that a majority of the audience may not notice

are the pieces for the backstage dressing rooms of the theatre. Before distressing the doors, we painted them three or four times and made them look nice. Painting in layers and then distressing, gives the doors an old, weathered look that evokes a theatre past its prime.


When did you get involved in theatre?

A: I've been performing since I was a child and I've always gotten encouragement from my family. Living in rural Oklahoma didn't offer many opportunities to perform other than at church or school functions. Originally, I thought Microbiology was my future. It wasn't until my second semester of my freshman year of college that I realized I wanted to major in Theatre. And, when I discovered in my sophomore year that I could work in theatre as a scenic artist, my course was set and I later earned my MFA in Theatre Design.



On an inauspicious morning at a Dutch library, a librarian makes an unexpected find in the overnight return box - a weather-beaten Baedeker guidebook 113 years overdue. "I first discovered the play when it was at the Soho Playhouse in NYC back in 2001. I was fascinated by the piece, the mystery and search for answers within the story, and the relationship created between the actor and the audience within the theatrical event. I found it to be an amazing play and an incredibly engaging production told through simplicity, intimacy, and real connection. It was exciting when years later Allen asked me to take a look at the script for a future production at Riverside, and now I am honored to be able to return to Vero Beach and share in this experience of story-telling with the Riverside audiences.

"This will be my fifth production at Riverside Theatre. (Past productions here include: *Sylvia*, *Rounding Third*, *She Loves Me*, and *Three Viewings*.) Riverside holds a special place for me for many reasons -- most importantly, because it was here that my wife Brenda and I first met each other back during 2004's *She Loves Me*. We now have a wonderful daughter,

Maysie, and have since moved to lowa where I am Head of the Acting Program in the Theatre Department at Cornell College. I will always be so grateful to Allen and the Riverside company for the many talents I have worked with in the past and for the many blessings I have received both on and off stage."

The play was written in 2001, and first produced by the Actor's Gang in Los Angeles. It moved on to the Soho Playhouse in New York where it ran for 450 performances. T. Ryder Smith was nominated for the Drama Desk Award for Outstanding Solo Player. Underneath the Lintel has been translated into eight languages and produced over 200 times by smaller theaters around the world.



You have an extensive biography in Dance performing not only in the Ballet world (Ballet Chicago, Ruth Page Ballet, Southern Ballet Theater), but also in major Broadway productions (Carousel, Fosse, Chitty Chitty Bang Bang, The Red Shoes). When did you know you wanted to make Dance your profession?

I was taking adult dance classes at Lou Conte Dance Studio in Chicago. In class one day, I saw a man staring at me. After class he approached me and asked me questions about what I was doing there. I told him I was taking classes for fun because I just love to dance. He introduced himself as Lou Conte. He told me that I have a lot of raw talent and could be a professional dancer, but I needed training. He offered me a scholarship. I've always loved dancing but was too afraid to commit to it as a profession. When he offered me the scholarship, it was like a sign and a validation of a dream I desired to be real. I took the scholarship, quit college, and moved out of my parents' house. I was nineteen years old.

Have you choreographed a production of West Side Story before?

Ironically, West Side Story was the first professional musical I choreographed. It was at the Woodminister Theatre in California. My wife, Lainie Sakakuram, who is an accomplished choreographer, was supposed to choreograph the show. She was unable to but recommended me for the job. I also ended up playing Riff in that production.

Do you take inspiration from Jerome Robbins' work for your interpretation?

Absolutely! His work is written all over the show. It's ingenious and so much a part of the fabric of this piece.

What can Riverside Theatre audiences expect from our production?



Going on 57 years...

Conceived by Arthur Laurents, Leonard Bernstein and Jerome Robbins in 1947, it took *West Side Story* ten years before it opened on Broadway. The story, based on *Romeo and Juliet* and originally called *East Side Story*, was set on the Lower East Side of Manhattan and portrayed the romance of a Jewish girl and Irish Catholic boy. Busy with other plays and movies, the three collaborators never managed to produce the musical.

In 1955, Oscar Hammerstein recruited Stephen Sondheim to join the team as lyricist. At that time, New York City was plagued with violent gang wars, and the team decided to change the conflict to a war between the Polish American Jets, and the Puerto Rican Sharks. The setting was moved to the west side of Manhattan in a neighborhood that was subsequently razed to build Lincoln Center; hence, the new title, *West Side Story*. The show marked a turning point in American musicals, due to its dark theme, extended dance sequences, sophisticated music, and focus on social problems.

In the spring of 1957, Stephen Sondheim recruited Hal Prince to direct, once the original director decided not to continue. Casting the show was difficult since the actors had to be proficient at singing, dancing and acting, and needed to be young enough to pass as teenagers.

Opening at the Winter Garden Theatre in September of 1957, the show ran for 732 performances and was nominated for six Tony Awards, including Best Musical.

The show was an even bigger hit in London where it played for three years. The movie *West Side Story* opened in 1961, starring Russ Tamblyn, Rita Moreno and Natalie Wood. It was an immediate blockbuster, winning ten of its eleven Academy Award nominations, including Best Picture. The stage show continues to be produced around the world.



SNEAK PEEK

INTO THE MIND OF Cliff Simon, Scenic Designer



was influenced greatly by having grown up in the Bronx during the same time period, though I was a little younger than the West Side Story characters. That world, as I remember it, was very colorful, active, and sometimes threatening. I moved to Manhattan when I was 20, and I spent a good deal of time roaming around the West Side Highway. By that time, it was deserted, ever present looming overhead, and in a sort of exciting way, exotic... like in a scary movie, maybe. So in this design, that highway is ever present and encroaching on the people in the play. When Tony and Maria escape into their world of love, their fantasy where everything is perfect for just the shortest time, the blink of an eye---then the stage opens up physically and there is more air and light on the stage. where their love can breathe. But not for too long before that ends...

heatre is such a collaborative art that each design feels rooted in the time and circumstances of its creation. In 1993. I saw a production of West Side Story in a performing arts center. As impressive as the show was, it was hard to connect to the characters from 200ft away in the balcony. The large scale of that production makes me appreciate the intimacy of productions at Riverside Theatre. The audience is never too far away from the drama unfolding on the stage, which I believe delivers a more enriching experience.

This is my first production of West Side Story, which sounds strange given a career in theatre spanning over 15 years. One element that I find

compelling in our upcoming production is the duality between the realistic and fantasy elements of the show. In the reality of the city, the set design conveys the confinement of an urban environment, with an abundance of steel, brick and concrete. By contrast, the fantasy moments will present a more open environment where the city fades away, showing the sky and the stars.

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


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DAVID PITTSINGER premieres "America, My America"

David Pittsinger, who recently played Emile de Becque to critical acclaim in last season's production of South Pacific, performed the song "America, My America" in September with the 40-piece U.S. Air Force Orchestra in Bowie, Maryland. Written by Allen D. Cornell, Riverside's Producing Artistic Director, and Ken Clifton, Riverside's Musical Director, "America, My America" is currently part of a re-imagined production of Midnight Clear, which took place in 2008. Set in a small coastal town in Maine in 1854, Midnight Clear is the tender love story of a Southern belle who falls for a Northern boy just before the Civil War and had its world premiere at Riverside in November of 2001.



Mr. Pittsinger added "America, My America" as an encore to his commissioned musical score. "Arlington Sons," a tribute to his late father, a U.S. veteran who served as a distinguished Tomb Guard at Arlington. "Arlington Sons" was performed by Mr. Pittsinger and his son, Richard, at Arlington National Cemetery accompanied by the U.S. Air Force Reed Quintet.

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

Designing a 3D Stage From 2D Art

Q: Is Charlie Brown your first Scenic Design endeavor? What others have you designed?

A: Charlie Brown is my first independent realized design.
Previously I co-designed Guys And Dolls with David "Kip" Shawger and did several theoretical designs while in school.

Q: What did you find challenging about designing this show?

A: Hand Drafting! I love to draw and I wanted to keep my renderings similar to the hand drawn cartoon style of Peanuts, but this meant spending a lot of time and energy over my drafting table.

Q: What inspired your design, and which parts of Peanuts are most prominent?

A: You're A Good Man Charlie Brown is a musical that brings a comic strip to life, and I wanted to put a little hint of the comic strip itself in my design. The set is reminiscent of a comic book page with its many "panels" that frame the comically short scenes.


