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

How old were you when you got involved in theatre?

I first became involved in theatre when I was in elementary school performing in a local community theatre on Long Island. My interests in performance continued throughout junior high and high school where I performed in the school plays. And it was in college when I was first introduced to the study of theatre and actor training – which has become an ongoing practice in my life that I have always enjoyed.

Did you know you wanted to make theatre a profession?

As a young person, I was always a bit frightened by the idea of making theatre a profession – fearing rejection; uncertain of whether I was worthy. There have been so many actors in my life whose work and work ethic have inspired me deeply – and there has always been a part of me wanting to measure up to that level of commitment and artistic expression. I don't know if I have ever

gotten there. But now, as I continue to get older, I find myself still challenging my own self to go further, deeper, fuller, simpler, etc ... in my work as an actor – but the difference today is that I find myself embracing that ongoing process.

And it is now a process no longer consumed by fear but

filled with a sense of joy and constant discovery in the making, performing, and practicing of theatre.

Where did you get your theatre education?

I studied at Stony Brook University where I received my BA in English and my MA in Theatre. I then went on to receive my MFA in Acting from the University of Iowa. I have also had the privilege of studying Shakespeare with Patsy Rodenburg, OBE and receiving advanced training in Meisner with the True Acting Institute. Education for me is lifelong, and I look forward to the learning I am able to receive as a working actor on the stage as well as a continuous student of acting within the workshop spaces and in ongoing training opportunities.

How long did you travel as a working actor?

I spent 12 years as a working actor traveling to different regional theatres around the country. I spent 3 years as a resident actor with the Barter Theatre in Virginia and also spent a great deal of time at The Fulton in Pennsylvania, Florida Rep, Iowa Summer Rep, and at two different Riverside Theatres – one in Iowa City and the other here at home in Vero Beach.

When did you become a director/teacher?

I moved into academia in 2007 when I became Head of the Acting program at Cornell College. I went on to become an Associate Professor of Theatre and the Department Chair during my time at the college. Along with teaching courses in acting, I also directed such shows at Cornell as Cabaret, The Elephant Man, Company, Waiting for Godot, Avenue Q, A Man of No Importance, and A Lie of the Mind.

Anything specific that prompted the focus to director/teacher?

The opportunity at the college to teach and direct seemed to fall out of the sky. I wasn't necessarily looking to move into academia; and yet, when this new adventure appeared, my wife and I decided to embrace it. The college and the community became a home to us for 9 years, and I am

incredibly grateful for all that I have learned from that experience.

How has your acting experience helped your teaching experience?

It is exciting to be teaching acting while also continuing to work as an actor. I found myself being able to work more closely with my students simply because I was teaching things

How do you see Riverside Children's Theatre's (RCT) programs expanding?

I am impressed by the wonderful talent and history that exists at RCT. The students are incredibly creative and dedicated, and the educators we have are filled with a love for teaching and an enthusiasm that is inspiring. In looking to the future, my hope is that we can continue to provide theatre education throughout the community – for the young people who come to learn about theatre, themselves, and one another whether it be in our classes, our productions, or our outreach programs; for our acting apprentices who come here from various parts of the country to perform, teach, and continue their training as young professionals; and for our adults in the area who may wish to seek out more opportunities to connect with their love for theatre, to study various plays and playwrights, and to celebrate the wonderful work they have come to appreciate at Riverside Theatre.

What are your thoughts about the Vero Beach community?


I am excited about living in Vero Beach. This has always been a special place for me. Riverside Theatre is where my wife Brenda and

"Hello Dolly was the first Broadway show I ever saw. We were in the last row of the top (2nd) balcony of the St. James Theatre in New York. Ginger Rogers was the star; the rest of the cast was the original. Years later, when I worked with Ginger, I thanked her for the wonderful beginning she gave me. She graciously said to me "That's what we do. We pass it on. Now it's your turn." So here I am passing it on. Not just this show, but every show I've ever seen that taught me, that moved me, that made me howl with laughter, that showed me that live theatre could overwhelm and excite

and move you deeply. Hello Dolly is interesting because it is a love song to the 1890's and a vaudeville style that is seldom seen nowadays, but still works fifty years later.....like gangbusters!

I also got to work with Michael Stewart, who wrote the book for Dolly. He was the best librettist ever. He could pare anything down to its essential elements, leaving plenty of room for the musical numbers. That's how he saw his job. and he was gifted at it. Compare the *Dolly* script to Thornton Wilder's The Matchmaker. The essence is there (and in some instances

enhanced), but Wilder engaged your brain. Michael engaged your heart. He also made people laugh out loud. And he eliminated the entire original third act! That's quite a trick! This allowed Jerry Herman to get all the credit for those wonderful musical moments he concocted.

In the end result, the character of Dolly Gallagher Levi survives beautifully as a passionate, determined, self-determining, and charming woman to this day. All in a setting that reminds us how far we've come. That's quite a lot for a musical theatre piece, no?"

ne of Broadway's most enduring hits. Hello Dolly opened on Broadway in 1964 and ran for 2,844 performances. Winner of ten Tony Awards, Hello Dolly held the record for most wins in a single year until 2001 when it was surpassed by The Producers, which won twelve.

Based on Thornton Wilder's play, The Matchmaker, the musical's score was composed by the legendary Jerry Herman. The Broadway production of Hello Dolly was directed and choreographed by Gower Champion and produced by David Merrick. Set in New York at the turn of the twentieth century, Dolly is a brassy widow who works as a matchmaker, dance instructor and mandolin teacher. She is hired to find a wife for Horace Vandergelder, a wealthy merchant from Yonkers, NY. The first candidate is Irene, owner of a hat shop in Manhattan. But Dolly decides she is ready to remarry, and contrives to win Horace for herself.

Horace goes to Manhattan to meet Irene. Meanwhile, Dolly has encouraged two of Horace's clerks to visit Irene and her shop assistant. The clerks pretend that they are wealthy playboys. Horace and Dolly arrive at Irene's shop, and the clerks quickly hide. When Horace discovers that there are men hiding in the shop, he storms out in a huff. Dolly mollifies him by introducing him to an heiress, Ernestina Money. All of the characters end up at the same fancy restaurant. Irene and her assistant fall in love with Horace's clerks. Dolly moves in on Horace, and convinces him that he should marry her and also approve of his niece's romance with an artist.

Carol Channing was cast as Dolly in the original show. Subsequent stars included Ginger Rogers, Betty Grable, Pearl Bailey, Phyllis Diller and Ethel Merman, both of whom turned down the role in the original production. The original cast album of Hello Dolly was the number one album on the Billboard pop chart in 1964. Louis Armstrong's recording of the song "Hello Dolly" was the number one single on the pop chart that year, and was inducted into the Grammy Hall of Fame in 2001.






The original title was DOLLY: A DAMNED EXASPERATING WOMAN. But, when Louis Armstrong's 1963 recording of the title song shot to the top of Billboard's pop chart, a spot that had been held by The Beatles for fourteen weeks, the title was quickly changed to HELLO DOLLY!





1938, the day Germany invades Poland, Mark St. Germain creates a vivid encounter with two of the most prominent intellectuals of the time – Sigmund Freud and C. S. Lewis.

Nearing the end of his life, Freud invites Lewis to his home to discuss a myriad of topics including religion, politics,

life and love. Known as the father of psychoanalysis, Austrian neurologist Freud fled Nazi persecution in 1938 and settled in England.

C.S. Lewis, a renowned British novelist, lay theologian, and professor, was born Catholic, became an atheist at age 15, and converted to the Anglican Church in 1931. His conversion was attributed to J.R. Tolkien, whom he met and befriended in 1926.

Freud, an atheist, is curious as to why Mr. Lewis suddenly reversed his position and now believes in God. Lewis is still relatively young, but argues cogently about his conversion to orthodox Christianity. The discussion is especially poignant since Freud knows he is near death and sees himself passing into nothingness. Is

Freud seeking self-analysis as well as seeking to understand Mr. Lewis's conversion?

The men challenge each other with a clash of ideas and experiences. As Britain enters World War II and future becomes clouded with doubt, these brilliant men discuss the existence of God and the meaning of life.

Based on a 1992 movie starring Whoopie Goldberg, Sister Act focuses on the exploits of nightclub performer, Deloris Van Cartier. When she witnesses her gangster boyfriend, Curtis Shank, murder someone he believes has ratted out his gang to the cops, she goes into hiding. Determined to tie up any loose ends, Curtis begins his search for Deloris before she can testify.

With Curtis' connections and knowledge of all parts of Philadelphia, the sheriff decides to hide Deloris in the last place anyone would expect to find her, in a conservative convent disquised as a nun.

Sister Act.

Hopelessly bored and out of place at the convent, Deloris volunteers her services to help the moribund choir.
Disapproving of Deloris but acknowledging her expertise, the Mother Superior reluctantly makes her choir director. To everyone's delight, the choir becomes an instant hit and garners huge donations for the financially shaky church.
As she testifies against the gang, she realizes she would

rather perform with the loyal nuns than pursue fame and fortune on her own. When the choir is selected to perform before the Pope, Curtis recognizes Deloris and he and his gang sneak into the convent dressed as nuns the night prior to their performance before the pontiff.

For most of these teens, this being a culmination of many years with our program, these one acts will serve as a nice showcase for their varied skills and strengths!




